May you live in 'interesting times' is said to be a **Chinese curse**....I am sure no-one has cursed me this year but it has been an '*interesting year'* since our May meeting. We had Rev Ian leave to take up a ministry placement at Semaphore Uniting. We journeyed with Peter and Pam through their illness and we were all very sad when they died - they have left a big hole in our community. We have journeyed with others who have had a tough year due to illness, not to mention my own trips to hospital – all these things and more have made 2010 an interesting time so far.

Some of the highlights of 2010 have been the **weekend music and worship workshop with Robin Mann** and the **Mini Field of Pink Women** event. I believe both events had a big impact on our community for very different reasons. Robin's time with us has injected some new ideas for worship and I thank the Helen Lee Memorial Trust for funding this event. The Mini Field of Pink Women was a wonderful community event and raised over \$1,000 for Breast cancer research. We plan to hold another in October 2011.

At times I was a little frustrated by a lack of communication around pastoral issues. I have missed some important events in people's lives because I didn't know. I would rather have 5 people tell me than no-one. I want you to know that I will make myself available to visit you if you need – just ring and ask me to come.

I am excited by the new focus for our 0.5 ministry position. I believe this will enhance our outreach to our local community. I am currently reflecting on changes I will need to make to my work patterns and priorities to accommodate the shift in focus back to the Sunday morning community with less time available for outreach to the local community.

My wider Synod work has been inspiring as I have watched the Thursday evening group for same-sex attracted women grow and develop. There have been so many amazing "God-moments" as I have journeyed with these women and a particular highlight was a weekend retreat in August. Many of these women were ostracized by their churches and often tell me how wonderful it is to reconnect with 'the church' and a Christian community. I am also the co-convener of Unity&Friends which advocates for a place in the church for Gay and Lesbian people. Apart from monthly Friday night meetings I work with individuals struggling with faith and sexuality issues. I have on average a phone call a fortnight from someone looking for a caring and inclusive church or just needing someone to talk.

I have continued my Master's study program but with only one subject each semester. This year I have been focussing on Missional Leadership and what it means for the church to be participating in God's Mission in a local setting. I have also continued to learn Indonesian so when we have more Papuan students, or if I return to Papua, I might be able to hold a basic conversation.

I have entered into my fifth year of ministry at Blackwood Uniting and this means at some point my name will automatically go back on the "I'm available" list for other placements. I have asked the council to conduct a discernment process in 2011 to help us to discern if you (BUC) and I are still a good match and if we have more things left to do together.

I still feel very privileged to be here at Blackwood Uniting and thank you all for your ongoing support. I would like to specifically thank a few people. Firstly a big thanks to Rev Malcolm McArthur for stepping into supply ministry. His pastoral support especially has been very appreciated. Thank you to Jackie for the skills she offers our community, not only when she is in the office but also behind the scenes too. I am grateful to Penny Harper who has been the stop gap in the office while Jackie has been away. Finally thank you to Janet M who has done a wonderful job with the Community Program over the past three years....I am sad to hear she is not coming back next year.

Report to Congregational Meeting Sun. November 21 2010

I had not made myself available for interim ministries since returning from an enjoyable pastoral stint in the U.K. I believe retirement should mean "fresh fields and pastures new" lest 'one good custom should corrupt the world'. (There I go quoting again!) Yet I have found the last four months of my 0.25 interim fill-in role time-consuming but satisfying.

Leanne's team-work, skills, and pastoral concern continue to win my admiration. It has been a period in which a number of key leaders have faced trauma. Leanne's empathy and outreach must have come at some cost to her. I now appreciate more fully, too, the hours of self-effacing acts of community maintenance, missional commitment and leadership from the many congregational members passing daily through our church buildings. It is inspiring to see so many sacrificing their own needs or pre-occupations out of concern for others.

The gifts which many bring to worship leadership and Leanne's encouragement of us to share our varied faith journeys continue to make the worship experiences special. I am glad, too, that we continue to offer varied styles by offering alternate times, music and inter-action in worship. We are the stronger for it. It has seemed to me important that we continue to reduce our minister's preparation time by having the same preacher at both services on a Sunday, allowing for some weeks when the considerable time taken for preparation of worship is lifted for her. (Preparation of a service of worship now takes longer than it did in four-hymn–sandwich days.)

After a life-time of seeking to work through up to a dozen committees at a time it is was wonderful to be relieved of that expectation in this role. We used to teach of the importance, for any organisation, to keep equal emphasis on missional <u>task</u>, individual needs and group <u>maintenance</u>. I have had no role in the <u>T</u> corner of that equilateral triangle and very minor role in <u>L</u> and <u>M</u>. That was appropriate and appreciated by me, but I am concerned at the risk of burn-out for some of our critical leadership. We have been blessed with outstanding lay leadership but no one should be expected to continue too long.

I admire the faithfulness and zeal of some of our oldest members too but increasing frailty and an aging leadership pool brings challenges. Community outreach through Kids' Hope, Friday Night hospitality, the Friday Friendship group, the Play group and of course, Community Clubs is our signature feature. The danger is, that unless we are able to offer group activity for the youth of new people in the district, unless we can again have a 'critical mass' of children and youth , our median age will continue to rise and energy for our community outreach will, perforce, wane. There is our Catch 22. There is a challenge for any new appointee.

CHURCH COUNCIL REPORT

I am pleased to report to the Congregation on the work of the Council over the past year.

The following people served on Council during the year : David Agnew, Alastair Blake, Ray Bown, Penny Harper, Ewan Hazeldine (Chair), Rev Ian Hunter, Rev Leanne Jenski, Anne Magarey, Heidi McNamara, Tony Otworowski, Ian Penny and Phil Rodda (until April).

The main work of Council has been the implementation of the Mission-based Budget which the Congregation enthusiastically adopted at last year's AGM. We recall that this radically different approach to budgeting followed a period of discernment by the Congregation lead by Rev Rob Stoner, together with our Ministers, in which we firstly determined what we believe God is calling us to do, then how much this mission would cost and finally how we would pay for it. The result was a budget with a deficit of some \$22,000. The last AGM accepted this budget challenge in faith that we had truly discerned God's calling and would therefore be committed to paying the resulting costs.

The Council's Culture of Generosity Task Group accepted the challenge of closing the budget gap and conducted the "Making a Difference" program during April/May when we were encouraged to review our personal giving. This resulted in a wonderfully generous response confirming our commitment to our mission. Particular thanks to Mark Gill and Ray Bown for their leadership in this crucial area. Council has also monitored the implementation of the new mission initiatives over the year, which has seen overwhelming support for the new Play Group, steady growth of the Friday Meals project, review of BUC as a welcoming place and the new sign about to be installed. Council acknowledges the work of the many volunteers involved in this work and is excited to see the outcomes of our discernment starting to bear fruit.

With the departure of Rev Ian Hunter, Council undertook a review of future ministry needs for BUC and proposed that the replacement 0.5 person should primarily focus on outreach ministry providing support and encouragement for the Community Program, Play Group, Friday Meals and Youth. As well this would look at possible new initiatives together with building bridges between these programs and the BUC worshiping community. Rev Leanne would focus on preaching, teaching and pastoral care for both 9.15 and 11.00 Sunday communities. Council's proposal was supported by the Congregation in September. The position was advertised in the New Times and a Joint Nominating Committee has been appointed.

At its last meeting Council acknowledged the work of Mission and Justice Co-ordination Group over recent years particularly in the areas of journeying with GKE church in Papua, the Kaurna, Kids Hope and the environment. We noted that this work may not be able to continue in its present form and will look at new possibilities next year. We thanked Alastair Blake, Enid Ninnes and Christa Megaw for their wonderful leadership over the years. In particular Council recorded its formal appreciation in the following extract from the minutes for the leadership of our friend, the Rev Peter Stephens in our work with the church in Papua.

"We note the work of Peter Stephens in initiating our work with the church in Papua with three different aspects: fundraising for an education project, the expedition to Papua from our congregation and the English immersion program. He brought vision and determination to this work. Peter's determination when the English program was almost cancelled by the Assembly at the last moment was impressive. Our journeying with the church in Papua that Peter conceived and nurtured has had a remarkable impact on our congregation and we give thanks for that."

RPEORT OF ELDERS AND LAY PREACHERS

1. Pastoral Care

The new arrangements for ensuring that the Pastoral Care needs of the 9.15 congregation are met are working well. Pastoral Care for the 9.15 congregation is the responsibility of a Pastoral Care Committee Co-Convened by Glenis Reid and Marnie Agnew. Pastoral Care is delivered through the Clusters or other meeting groups within the church and any member not associated with a cluster or another regular group is allocated to one of the members of the Pastoral Care Committee. A particular challenge is the efficiency of sharing information between the 11.00am congregation and the 9.15am congregation.

2. Life and Faith at the Roundabout Forums

The three forums held during 2010 have been very successful in making connections with the community and have seen significant increases in the attendance by individuals not associated with Blackwood Uniting Church.

The Forums were:

Asylum Seekers – Who are They?-in conjunction with the Blackwood Circle of Friends Meet the Candidates-in conjunction with Action for World Development, Blackwood Australia's Population Futures.

3. Faith Sharing

Faith Sharing evenings have continued during 2010 with a changed format, due to the difficulty of arranging for individuals who have not previously shared their faith stories to do so. During 2010 one speaker each month has shared the story of their faith journey, followed by questions. Following this the group devotes some time to the consideration of one of a number of questions relating to faith submitted by the group. It is foreshadowed that the format of these evenings may change again when they resume in March 2011.

4. Study on the Christian Creeds

Rev Leanne led a study of the Christian creeds during September. Further studies on aspects of the Christian faith and/or bible studies are planned for next year, beginning with a study during Lent.

5. Christianity for the Rest of Us

Over the last twelve months Elders and the Church Council have participated together at the start of each other's meetings in alternative months in studying a chapter of the Diana Butler Bass book "Christianity for the Rest of Us" each month. The book outlines the results of the author's research among progressive, thriving churches in the United States which led her to identify the characteristics which have led to a transformation of neighbourhood churches.

- Please only smoke in the designated area.
- Violence, drugs & alcohol are not permitted on these premises.

Playgroup Report for the Annual General Meeting November 2010

As we came to the end of our first year of playgroup we look back on a very full and satisfying year.

- During the course of the year we have had involvement with approximately 90 families comprising approx 115 children.
- Five babies have been born in the group with another half dozen expected in the next few months.
- Four children have graduated to full-time Kindy, with several other 4-year-olds still continuing to attend while their Kindy days do not include Monday.
- Numbers have settled to between 20 and 30 families attending each week; this is a much more
 manageable number! We currently have around 60 families still on the 'regular' list, though not all
 come every week. Over the course of the year a number of families have dropped out as parents have
 gone back to work or moved interstate, but there is still a regular intake of one or two new families
 most weeks.
- The original Mums & Bubs group has disbanded when some mums went back to work and the other babies grew up and were ready for the older group.

The special qualities of the playgroup that set it apart from other groups in the area include:

- Hospitality the provision and serving of morning tea for the adults, the welcoming presence of Glenis
 on the front counter, the ready and willing helpers who hold babies while mums and dads do activities
 with older children, or look after a child while mum breastfeeds...
- Program free play, both inside and outside, is combined with the opportunity to choose more specific activities like painting, playdough, craft, singing, story-time, dress-ups, home corner and puppet theatre, with a simple theme each week (Friends term 1, Autumn term 2, My Body term 3, Animals term 4)
- Pastoral care through the adults from the church who sit, chat and listen with parents, help with a difficult child, take an interest in a child with particular needs, follow-up absences or illness with a phone call or email; and the intentional setting aside of a time to say thanks, happy birthday, welcome and goodbye

Into 2011:

- **Mums & Bubs group:** We are still hoping another Mums & Bubs group will take advantage of the facilities we offer but are waiting for the CYH nurse to contact us.
- Equipment: The regular weekly \$2 donations from families more than covers the weekly costs of paint, paper, craft supplies, etc. with the occasional special treat for the end of term celebration e.g. Easter eggs at the end of term 1, face painting term 2, and a balloon artist at our Christmas break-up. However, we would like to continue to purchase books that are suitable for 2-3 year olds, on the themes we explore, and we also wish to add some more play equipment to the outdoor play area. The original climbing equipment was designed for Primary school children and we really need equipment that is of a suitable size and design for pre-schoolers. We hope to apply for some grants but would also like to enlist the church's support in some fund-raising.
- Worship for families: We are having our first worship event for families in the afternoon of December 12th, where we will invite families from the playgroup and the Community Program creche, the baptism families and any families of young children that members of the congregation would like to invite, to celebrate Christmas, hear the Christmas story, sing some carols, and participate in a simple worshipful Christmas activity (including making something to take home), with afternoon tea provided. If this is well received we will look at ending each term with a Sunday afternoon celebration of the term's theme, involving Bible story, songs and 'worshipful activity', plus afternoon tea. We also plan to explore the idea of a half-hour weekday "God-time" for little children, and also possibly a half-hour weekday music-time session, and eventually a monthly "Messy Church for families for older children all in good time... or God's time... If anyone would like to help with these activities please talk to Marnie or Rev Leanne. If you would like to help with hospitality either at the special events or go on the weekly roster, please talk to Jean Potter.
- **Belair Playgroup:** We are assisting Bec Brown from Belair to set up a Playgroup at Belair UC from Feb 2011, along similar lines to ours, specifically with advice and mentoring.

- the property committee for fixing things promptly, cutting legs off tables, and generally doing whatever we ask, as well as for the new paint job, carpet and curtains which have transformed the Dene Room
- Doug Gibson for repainting our small chairs
- Janine from Blackwood Childcare Centre who freely passes on surplus paper, toys and equipment
- Steph from Mindfield Books for the book carousels and the Thomas the Tank Engine book display shelf which has increased the children's use of books significantly.

Letter to Beacon Supporters

Thank You all for your ongoing interest, involvement and care in assisting Beacon to help our neighbours who find themselves struggling with the 'expenses of life'.

Beacon Volunteers continue to meet new clients and supply support for clients with ongoing problems.

The Mitcham Hills Inter-church Council Inc. was recently notified that our application for a grant from the Commonwealth Department of Families & Housing, Community Services & Indigenous Affairs (F&HCSIA) was successful.

This means that Beacon will be able to purchase its own Laptop Computer and Software to begin the process of becoming and independent 'mobile office' in the near future.

Our use of the office space at the Blackwood Church of Christ will continue along with access to the Internet and use of the church photocopier. Beacon hopes to purchase a mobile phone system in the

near future allowing us to create an independent office. We will be able to have our own Beacon email address.

Mitcham Council has also approved a grant to assist Beacon clients.

Christmas 2010.

Beacon is now working toward Christmas Hampers for our clients. Lions - Blackwood, are happy to work with us again. Their volunteers collect foods and make up the hampers and we supply some donated food items. We distribute Lions' hampers to our clients.

Curves - Blackwood will again be collecting suitable foods for our Hampers and also for the holidays. Curves – Blackwood have been supporting Beacon for 2 years, keeping our shelves well stocked from their Food Drives. We are really heartened by the support of the Manager and Curves clients'. In 2009 Curves supplied toys for the children of Beacon clients.

Beacon also receives a constant flow of food from local churches, schools and other community groups. We are also very thankful for the monetary donations that we receive.

Flight Centre – Blackwood continue to donate 1% of travel sales to anyone who mentions Beacon when booking their trip.

This year BankSA - Blackwood have offered to collect toys for the children of Beacon clients. They have erected a Christmas tree in their office and there are tags on the tree stating the age and gender of a child making it possible for people to purchase a suitable gift for that person. The BankSA manager has also offered for their clients to collect gifts for Beacon adult clients. We are very grateful to BankSA for their generosity and involvement.

Community Program Report to the Congregation, November 2010

It is that time of the year when the Program classes have ended, but we still have the Createabout event to go, so we haven't really breathed and reflected. What has 2010 been like for those in and around the Program?

- It has been a year of some sadness, with some of our participants undergoing long treatment for illness or disease, and some just beginning that journey. There has been grief and loss, due to death or inability to attend classes.
- We balance that with news of new life, either for participants or their offspring. We have a number of great-grandparents attending!!
- Where once this Program was envisaged to serve young mums in the area who may have been lonely and had few social connections, the reality now is very different. Most young mothers are going back into the workforce when their child is 12 months old, and so may only consider attending a program such as ours for a short time. We now serve the older participant, who may be working part-time or has retired. This demographic is determining our classes offered, although we continue to send publicity to kindergartens and schools, and to promote the free crèche.
- We experience a dramatic drop in attendance in the winter months, due to illness and grey nomads flying north for the winter. This is not restricted to our Program, but is a fact of life for all Community activities involving this demographic.
- A recent article in the Hills and Valley Messenger highlighted the importance of the Community Program to one of our participants, Sue. This was a really sensitive article, and we are grateful to the Messenger for the positive publicity that is has generated.
- Attendance at our Shed program on Wednesday mornings at Belair UC is very stable. We have a very active group of men who refurbish bikes, support each other and tell the most dreadful jokes. The Community Program Management Committee has recently voted to support the continuation of their work by granting money to extend the shed they occupy.

If you know anyone who needs a good bike, the Shed is open Wednesdays 9.30-12noon for a great bargain (or you can donate a bike to them)

- We have an excellent cast of tutors who faithfully attend each week, many of them going beyond what we expect of them as tutors. So many of the student's pastoral concerns are passed on by the tutors, and they play a vital role in the caring of the Program.
- Our Program would not function without our cast of volunteers we rely very heavily on their efforts and good humour. If you have any time spare regularly on a Wednesday afternoon or Thursday morning, and could help out in the office, that would be greatly appreciated. To the volunteers who help set up, shift furniture, help in

the office or care for our participants, a huge thank you – you are the face of this church to the Program participants, and you do it so well.

- Create-about is nearly upon us. This is our only fundraiser for the Community
 Program for the year, and we need your help!! If you can give us an hour to sit at the
 door and greet people, or to shift furniture on Wednesday 24th and back again on
 Saturday 27th, or to help out in the kitchen for an hour, we would be most grateful. This
 is an opportunity for the Community Program people to see the church in action and to
 "cross-pollinate", you never know, you may meet someone really interesting.
- If the Community Program is to really be such a large part of the Church's outreach to the local community, then it is going to need more participation from the church body. It is not enough for the Coordinator and two pastoral care people to take care of everyone's needs in the Program. Whilst the Program is very largely self funded, it is very much understaffed in terms of pastoral care and volunteer time. If you think you could play a role in this important ministry, please see Leanne to find out how you can help.
- Finally, this is my last report to the Congregation, as I am not renewing my contract. I wish the church well into the future, and I pray that Community Program can continue to reach out and help people make important connections that can make such a positive difference in their lives.

I have thoroughly enjoyed my time at Blackwood UC, and thank those who have supported me and made the days sparkle. Janet Maschmedt

BLACKWOOD UNITING CHURCH LIBRARY REPORT

Do you want to be inspired? To grow in your Christian faith? To learn how to help others more effectively? Or just to relax and be entertained? The church library has books, DVDs and CDs for you.

"Frida" is the story of a girl whose family was brutally murdered and she herself was left for dead in Rwanda but who learnt to forgive and inspire others to forgive.

In "Three Cups of Tea" Greg Mortenson brings schools and hope to people living in the remote mountains of Pakistan. In "Stepping Out of Darkness: One Women's Story of Triumph Over Depression" Lisa Limrick uses diary entries to describe her depressive illness but she also sensitively describes the importance of God's working in her treatment and subsequent lifestyle.

"Kingdom, Grace, Judgement: Paradox, Outrage and Vindication in the Parables of Jesus" by Robert Farrar Capon offers a fresh adventurous look at all of Jesus' parables treated according to their major themes. The author's daring insight bridges the gap between the biblical world and our own. "God in the Present Moment: Prayer in the 21st Century" by Hedley Beare gives suggestions how to pray and is a challenge to a more active and meaningful prayer life.

Several donated books are helpful in pastoral care. "What Can I Say" by Karen and Simon Fox tackles the dilemma which faces many of us. In her book "Walking Through the Waters" Nancy Regensburg brings a spiritual perspective to what is often a chaotic, frightening experience. She kept a journal during the diagnosis and treatment of her husband's Hodgkin's disease and here shares her insights guiding readers to spiritual resources. "House Rules" by Jodi Picoult is not only an entertaining novel but also gives us a glimpse into the world of both a child with Asperger's as well as the effect it has on the family.

Mission and Justice Report

- 1. Activity in 2010: In the early part of the year, the experiences of the group who visited West Papua and the visit of Elna and Elisa for English immersion enriched us all. The Kids Hope program has continued to be a blessing to children and their mentors. Issues about the environment have challenged us. Our journey with the Kaurna people continues to be a slow one of building trust. We focused on each of these priority themes in our Sunday worship for one month during the year. Mary Thomas' dried fruit sales have resulted in significant support for Frontier Services and there have been occasional sales of Fair Trade products and Outback Pride bush food products. We thank the people who have laboured on these and other Mission and Justice activities. A new Mission and Justice brochure showing these activities is available and details are included on the church's Web bite.
- 2. Priority Themes for 2011: For the past two years we have focused on a set of priority themes with the structure: local, Indigenous, international and environmental. In 2011 we will continue this with the themes:
 - **Journeying with the Blackwood Hills Circle of Friends**: We will seek to support this community group in their work with refugees and asylum seekers.
 - Journeying with Aboriginal People: This is mainly a focus on our recognition project with the Kaurna people, but will include other Indigenous issues, particularly our contact with Ngarrindjeri people.
 - Journeying with our Partner Churches: This is mainly a focus on our relationship with the GKI in Papua but will also include issues faced by other churches in partnership with the Uniting Church in Australia.
 - **Sacredness of All Creation**: This is a focus on awareness of our impact on the environment and how we respond responsibly.
- **3. Papua:** Council has noted the work of Peter Stephens in initiating our work with the church in West Papua through fundraising, the visit to Papua and the English immersion program. He brought vision and determination to this work. Our journeying with the church in Papua that Peter conceived and nurtured has had a remarkable impact on our congregation and we give thanks for that.

A new group under the leadership of Jane Bassham has been formed to continue the work Peter began. We have informed the Synod International Mission office that Blackwood is prepared to host students for English immersion in 2011 if the program is repeated.

4. Coordinating Group: We thank Nancy Cranwell for being part of the coordinating group this year. We have asked Council to consider how our Mission and Justice work is best led into the future.

<u>Report to Congregation – November 2010</u> <u>Blackwood Uniting Church Communications Group (BUCComms)</u>

The last BUCComms report to the congregation was written by Pam Marlow and published for the meeting in May of this year. Pam was very much the driving force for this group and we have all keenly felt her loss. Most of the activities reported on previously are still ongoing with individuals from the group carrying on the tasks.

1. Electronic church calendar –

- a) This is updated regularly by Penny Harper (backup by Karen Collins) after noting bookings/events recorded on the Wall Board and Booking Book in the office.
- b) The calendar automatically makes this information available via the church's website to members of our church as well as those in the wider community wishing to learn more about our activities/events and what rooms are being used.
- c) Penny (backup by Karen) also prints out a hard copy of the calendar and pins it on the "What's On" board in the foyer each week to make this information available to visitors and/or people without computer access.
- d) The publicly available calendar is augmented by a hidden BUCComms calendar that keeps track of bookings while respecting the privacy of some groups/individuals.

2. Noticeboards -

- a) Continue to be used as before although the strict use of each board is not always monitored now.
- b) The group looking into "Welcoming" in our church have made some suggestions for additional information to be included. This has not been acted on as it will mean some discussion amongst the BUCComms team members to sort out the details and volunteers to look after the new ideas.

3. Website –

- a) The website is updated several times a week by various members who've come forward to look after different areas.
- b) New areas (or significantly developed areas) of the website since the last report include: Quote of the Week (Enid Ninnes), Rooms for Meetings (Ray Bown & Bob Lyon), the Library's Recent Additions and Book Review (Joy & Bryan Belling), church History pages (Keith Rodda), Roundabout Playgroup (Marnie Agnew), Youth & Young Adults (Heidi McNamara), Mission & Justice Update (Enid Ninnes), Coming & Regular Events as well as News Archive items, we have added "A Fair Trade Community" description to our home page, the main menu has been redesigned to keep the "Home" button clear of any submenus, and new Links have been added to the sidebar.
- c) Additions to the website discussed in the last report have not made much progress due to Karen's added responsibilities at her workplace. Stay tuned!
- d) One of the companies that had been giving free hosting to Uniting Churches' websites through the Synod has changed ownership and the new owner is no longer prepared to give us all free hosting. We will be "moved" along to the Synod's own system, but we now have to pay a (very reasonable) price for this service and the support the Synod offers along with it.
- 4. **External** signage (erecting an electronic sign facing the roundabout) Joan Hazeldene led this project for BUCComms, along with a subcommittee, taking it through possible design scenarios, costings, and investigated necessary Mitcham City Council permissions. It has now been handed over to the Property Committee who are working with Council to take this project through to completion when all the pieces have been put in place.
- 5. List of useful contacts for promoting events at Blackwood UCA A database of contact details was very much a personal project of Pam Marlow's. The basic database files have been handed over, but it will take someone with an interest in marketing our church's activities effectively, some Access database skills, some time and a willingness to adopt this project to take it forward.

The key word here is taking things "forward". Although Phil Marlow has given Karen Collins the collection of BUCComms material, including the digital files that Pam had been developing, Karen is not in a position to take over the role Pam played for BUCComms. So, we are looking for someone to guide this group and, perhaps, bring some more new ideas about how we can better communicate within and without the Blackwood Uniting Church Community.
