

Reconciliation Pentecost Dove

You will need:

For Dove:

- white paper plate
- markers
- scissors
- sticky tape
- string or ribbon

For twirler:

- paper to print or draw the spiral on
- markers, coloured pencils or crayons
- scissors
- string, yarn, or ribbon
- stapler or sticky tape

What to do:

Dove:

- On the back of the paper plate draw lines for the body and wings of the dove. Each should take up 1/3 of the plate. Draw the body first. The outside pieces become the wings, and the middle becomes the body of the dove.



- Cut the pieces and assemble the dove with one of the wings on each side of the body. The curved side of the wings faces down, the straight side faces up.
- Sticky tape the wings onto the back of the dove.
- Draw on some simple feet, a beak, and 2 eyes with markers.
- Attach a loop of string, wool or ribbon to the top to hang it by.

Twirler:

- Print the spiral, or you can draw your own, starting from the edge moving towards the centre.
- Colour the hands on the spiral in red, yellow and black — the colours of the Indigenous flag. Red represents the red earth, yellow represents the sun and black represents the Indigenous people.
- Colour the rest of the spiral with patterns and flames.
- Cut the paper along the spiral line.
- Attach the string to the middle of the spiral with a stapler or sticky tape, then attach the other end to the dove's tail.
- Hang it up and watch the flames and hands twirl!

Optional extra: You can tie pieces of ribbon to the sides for a cascade effect.
